IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT CHANGES TO THE SCHOOL MEALS PAYMENT SYSTEM

Next week the school will be changing from Squid to a new payment system called WisePay.

Currently our school community uses Squid to pay for meals eaten on the premises. We will be implementing the new system, WisePay, from next week. As part of the change over there will be a small window of **one day** when you will be unable to top up your child's Squid account. That day will be **Tuesday 3rd July**. You can continue to top up Squid until 5pm on Monday 2nd July to ensure that there is enough balance to cover any food or drink bought on Tuesday. From Wednesday 4th July top up will be via the new system only. WisePay logins will be sent out for this early next week.

Please note that all money already in credit on Squid will be automatically rolled over to WisePay on 4th July.

In summary:

You can top up Squid until 5pm on Monday 2nd July.

Please ensure your child has money in their account for using on Tuesday $\mathbf{3}^{\text{rd}}$ July.

Tuesday 3rd July– **Squid closed** to all further top ups and new system not yet running.

Wednesday 4th July – top up using WisePay only from now

New WisePay logins will be emailed to you from Monday 2nd July.

All balances on Squid will be automatically transferred to WisePay on 4th July.




'The Enemy', by Charlie Higson - book review

This is a book about survival in a post-apocalyptic world. 'The sickness struck everyone over fourteen. First it twisted their minds. Next it ravaged their bodies. Now they roam the streets - crazed and hungry.' The book is about a disease that struck everyone over the age of fourteen, leaving the children to fend for themselves. The Enemy follows two people, Maxie - the second of the Waitrose gang, and Small Sam, who is part of the Waitrose gang, but got separated from them through capture by the grown - ups. It follows their journeys through London, who they meet, and you find out the ways other kids have taken to whilst trying to survive.

When I first read this book, it pulled me in. Now, it is one of my all-time favourites and the book I recommend to anyone when they ask for something to read. You never guite know what to expect; there are twists and turns at every moment. This book plays on your emotions, and was the first book that I ever cried whilst reading. It's one of those books that you don't want to stop reading, and the saddest moment is when you finish it and it's all over. I can always go back to this book, and it never gets boring.

My favourite part is when the children find a department store. As they are living in a world with no civilisation, food and clothing must be either made themselves, or found from places such department stores. When the children find a department store in London, it is like a dream come true. For the first time since the sickness spread. these children get the chance

to have something new, something they haven't been able to have the pleasure of having for a very long time. This scene in the book makes you realise just how lucky we are in this world, and how much we have that we need the world to be working in order to have. This part is my favourite because it shows how important the things that we take for granted truly are.

I would recommend for Teens, it is a very visual book with many zombie - like characters in it. However, if you feel you can stomach it - read away at whichever age you please!

Seth Seppi is the kitchen boy at the Last Chance Hotel, which sits deep within a forest, and is also the new host of some mysterious guests. But when there is a murder, and Seth is the main suspect, he must attempt to clear his name. To do this he must try to solve a seemingly impossible case with the help of his talking cat. Things simply could not have got more bizarre.

I could not put down "The Last Chance Hotel" when I had started. It was a thrill ride from start to finish. I loved the characters and the constant air of mystery they each added. It hung over the book on every page as you follow Seth on his journey and try to solve the murder before he does. The story sets up a whole new magical world contained inside this whodunnit. It has all the elements you could hope for with twists and turns every few pages.

My favourite part about the book was definitely the mystery. I had no idea who it was throughout and was shocked at the end. The book misleads you every time you think you've solved it and you never see what's coming next. YEAR 12 CAREERS DAY





On Friday 29th June, Year 12 took part in a Careers Day. The day kicked off with a group of 5 alumni, speaking about their experience since leaving Furze Platt. They spoke about the following range of careers and our thanks must go to them. James Cawthorpe (finance); Greg Adams (media); Caroline Mastermind-Smith (Pharmacy); Tom Watts (media); Ryan Jones (finance/military). It was great to hear such a variety of experience and success from people who were, just a few years ago, sat in the same seats as our current Year 12 Students. After that, the year group took part in 4 one hour sessions.

The first was led by Mr Angier who focussed on interview techniques. The purpose of this session was to give students a taste of some of the most difficult interview questions that regularly appear at interview, model the best way to answer them and give students a go at role playing a mock interview.

The next session was called Power to Perform. It was a practical hands on cooking session that would allow students to develop some basic cooking skills. Using some basic ingredients, students were taught how to cook a variety of nutritious meals that would equip them with the nutrition to perform at their best.

We were very lucky to have two external speakers join us for the day. Firstly, Kim from Ask Apprenticeships came in to provide some expertise on the minefield of apprenticeship options with resources, giving our students a balanced view of post 18 options. Students also benefited from meeting a current higher level apprentice who was able to answer questions they had. Secondly, Jeff Lloyd very kindly came into provide a session on finance. Students got the opportunity to learn about how student finance works and also important skills such as budgeting.
