We hope your son / daughter is looking forward to their Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award practice expeditions over the weekend.

Further to feedback from students, staff and expedition leaders, please see below for important information relating to the assessment expedition on the $12^{\text{th}} \& 13^{\text{th}}$ May.



- To make it less chaotic when dropping your child off, we have decided to stagger the start times. Please bear this in mind if you are lift sharing and ensure if lifts are shared they are with the correct groups as groups will be starting and different places.
- Groups 1- 6 from Group A, and Groups 12- 17 from Group B should arrive at their start point for 9.30am.
- Groups 7- 11 from Group A, and Groups 18- 22 from Group B should arrive at their start point for 10am.
- Parents must wait for students to be signed in by the Instructor before making their way home.
- Students must not use their phones during the assessment. Only one person in the group is permitted to bring their phone, for emergency use only, and this should be kept in a sealed bag. Any student caught using their phone could contribute to the whole group being deferred.
- Students are expected to demonstrate excellent behaviour and treat staff from BXM with respect at all times.
- Please encourage your child to pack their own rucksack for the assessment (tips on how to do this can be found online), and plan their own meals.

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wouldn't be leaving anytime soon. Cancer was our, or my, monster under the bed.

I would see him in the corner of the living room, blending in with the shadows if it wasn't for the eyes.

Slowly, day after day I noticed him getting smaller and weaker, the odd flames on his body were dying down as the medicine began to take over and roam mum's body. It was finally happening, he was starting to leave! But only gradually and bit by bit.

The weeks went by and I hardly noticed him. Then one day, he seemed smug about something. Mum went into hospital with an infection that made her weak, yet again, but that wouldn't stop her, or us. More medicine and treatment sent her home and she punched through the thin wall that cancer had been trying to desperately build, but he didn't know her strength, and he hadn't had the full blow yet!

The day finally came that mum went into hospital and cancer was attacked with scalpels and more medicine that dug and eventually ripped him out of his shelter that didn't belong. I watched as he withered and disappeared from our lives.

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
