PICKING UP AND DROPPING OFF STUDENTS



Please can parents and carers be courteous when picking up and dropping off at the front of school.

We recognise that this area can get congested at the start and end of the day. This annoys fellow drivers and also causes congestion and potential health and safety dangers for students walking to and from school.

Longer term and as part of our site improvement work the council will be improving the layout at the front of the school but in the meantime we thank you for your support.



LOCKDOWN PROCEDURE

In the next two weeks we will be training students on our Lockdown Procedure. This is a procedure that nearly all schools have in case of eventualities like an intruder on site, a nearby chemical leak or a police incident near to the school. The purpose is to ensure students, staff and visitors to our site are safe during whatever event occurs. Tutors will be training students on how the procedure works and then we will practice this. Our aim is not to alarm you or your children - rather this training aims to ensure that we are all safe and know how to react in case of this very unlikely eventuality.

BREAK ARRANGEMENTS



Parents and guardians will be aware that we have been trialling a single break over the last two weeks. As explained in the newsletter a few weeks ago we trialled this arrangement for a number of reasons:

- Following the completion of the cafe work there is extra capacity for all students to buy and eat their food.
- Less noise and disruption around lessons when other students are on break.
- All our students being able to socialise at break times.

Following the trial we have sought feedback from staff and students.

Our staff have responded overwhelmingly positively to the trial. In addition to the reasons highlighted above staff have noted that:

- It is easier for students to access their teachers at breaks (previously they may have been teaching).
- Students have been mixing across the year groups.

The reaction of our students has been more mixed. They have highlighted several positives including:

- The structure of the school day is preferable; in particular many of our Year 7 and 8 students have expressed the view that "having one lesson in the afternoon makes the day fly by".
- The quality of the food in the cafe is better as our staff only need to prepare for two not four sittings.
- Being able to mix with students from across the school.
- More study time and space for our Sixth Form either in the Library or Hall/Canteen.

However, they have also highlighted things we need to address including:

- Space it is more crowded in the hall and cafe.
- The queues can be 5-10 minutes in length.
- The need for more seating for students.
- The wish to have more space to play ball games.

Following consideration of all the feedback we have made the decision to continue the single break arrangement for the foreseeable future. We know that should we decide to we could return to the previous arrangements at any point. Mindful of the feedback we are putting the following additional lunchtime arrangements in place from Monday.

- Opening the Gym to offer students more inside space.
- Making students more aware that our tennis courts are open and available for ball games (currently there are only a few students playing on them).
- Ensuring a greater range of food is available towards the end of break.
