LESSONS FROM AUSCHWITZ PROJECT

Two of our Year 12 girls, Chloe Smith and Bethany Wright-Paramio, visited some of the Holocaust sites in Poland as part of their studies. This impressive article (printed here in full) was written by the girls.





'We applied to take part in the 'Lessons from Auschwitz Project' provided by the Holocaust Educational Trust. This entailed a seminar in London with 200 other young people from the West London area, where we met Zigi Shipper, a holocaust survivor. Through Zigi, we learnt about pre-war Jewish life and the importance of remembering the individuals rather than the statistics. He recounted his holocaust experience which shocked us because he was younger than us when he arrived at Auschwitz-Birkenau (15).

A week later, at five in the morning, we arrived at Gatwick for our day long trip to Poland where we would visit Auschwitz I and Birkenau. When we arrived in Poland it was heavily snowing as we made our way to the town of Oswiecim, renamed Auschwitz during the war. The town felt it like it was stuck in the 1940's and the colourful buildings made it feel as if the town's population was trying to distinguish the new town of Oswiecim from the horrors that had occurred there over 70 years ago.

On the coach to Auschwitz I, we were both very apprehensive as we didn't know how we would react. We were told that seeing was very different to hearing, and this was very true. We started our tour under the infamous "Arbeit Mach Frei" gates (work sets you free) which impacted us in the sense that the sign and the architecture of the place was so deceiving to what actually happened there. We were surprised by how small Auschwitz I was and each brick barrack was devoted to telling parts of the history of the Holocaust. Through seeing belongings and pictures of the victims, we were struck by the attempt to re-humanise as many people as possible, who could so easily be forgotten. Our tour guide took us past the Commandant's house that is now inhabited by a normal Polish family, and we just couldn't comprehend how the Commandant could be responsible for sending thousands to their death every day and then go home and play with his children, 500 yards from a gas chamber. This is something that particularly made us think about the blurred line between perpetrator and bystander. Can we really blame one person for the horrors, or do we share the blame to include anyone who had even the smallest amount of involvement of the systematic persecution of minorities.'



When we got to Birkenau, we were met by the bleak tundra which reflected the emptiness of the site. The scale of Birkenau was overwhelming, twenty two times the size of Auschwitz I so there was no way we could see it all, however the most poignant symbol of the holocaust ran directly through the middle. The railway track that stretched from Toulouse in the west and the island of Rhodes in the south made Auschwitz-Birkenau the central destination of all transportations. Meaning that right where we stood was the inevitable last stop. The railway was symbolic as the selection process occurred there, where hundreds of thousands of families were separated and each individual was either sent right if they were capable to work or left, if they were considered 'undesirable'. These people were sent to certain death. Staring in disbelief at the ruins of gas chambers and crematoria, we found it hard to fathom the enormity of what had happened.

The candlelight ceremony marked the end of our day. All 200 of us gathered together at the end of the railway track and listened to the Rabbi that came with us recite prayers to those who suffered in the holocaust. It provided comfort for all of us as we forgot about the numbing cold and the blisters on our feet and we focused on remembering the events of over seven-ty years ago. We lit the candles and placed them on the track that seems so ominous and foreboding, we felt hope as they filled a place so full of darkness with a little bit of light. We had mixed feelings when leaving Birkenau as there was a certain guilt of walking out of a place where over one million people never did but we also felt uplifted and determined to make sure the evidence of the atrocities committed here would never happen again.

From this experience we have learnt the importance of not being a bystander in times of injustice and standing up for what is morally right. We have taken from this that if everyone can provide a little bit of light in a world that has the potential for so much darkness, then a lot of good can be done.'
