A Return for our Year 10 and 12 students

My week has been dominated by planning how we can meet the government's desire that we "offer some face-to-face support to supplement the remote education of Year 10 and Year 12 students who are due to take key exams next year." Conversations have ranged from organising a timetable to the details of clothing, food and cleaning toilets. I am sure that many parents and carers will have had similar conversations in their workplace. As you will appreciate there is much to consider and, as I write this, still some uncertainty. While we are aware of much of the safety advice, government guidance for secondary schools is still yet to be published and we hear that a final decision will be made on 28th May.

I have written separately to students, parents and carers in Year 10 and 12 today indicating plans and timescales as to how we may manage a return in the first few weeks of Term 6. The government announcement has also led to some queries about whether the new arrangements open up the possibility of more online work for younger years. This is in discussion and I am hopeful we can also make something happen in Term 6.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF GOVERNORS

At present, we are taking the government's advice and encouraging parents and students to remain home as much as possible.


Please be assured that as soon as restrictions have been further relaxed by the government we will look at arranging a safe way for these to be collected.

WEEKLY TIMETABLE PLANNERS


Mrs Feather has created some helpful 'Planning your week during lockdown' presentations which you can find on our website.

DAY IN THE LIFE OF A FURZE PLATT PARENT KEYWORKER

Dr Françoise Ticehurst, Emergency Medicine Consultant

I always wanted to be a doctor since I was very young, and feel very proud to be able to make such a difference to my patients' lives, especially at a time like this.

I work as an Emergency Medicine consultant, which many of you may know better as A&E. Some of you may even have had to visit an Emergency Department.




I don't really have a 'normal' week as I work shift work, sometimes starting early in the morning and sometimes working late into the evening. I usually start my shift by leading a handover with all the emergency medicine doctors who are on shift with me, where we catch up about all the important things that are currently happening in the emergency department. The rest of my shift will be very varied between looking after very sick patients in resus, seeing children in the paediatric emergency department and making initial assessments of those patients who arrive in the department by ambulance. What I enjoy most about my job is the variety that each day holds and that you really do save lives, which is an amazing privilege.

I went to Wycombe High School where I had an amazing time, worked really hard and made some super friends whom I'm still friends with today. I got thoroughly stuck into school life and got involved in choirs, orchestras and sports. I stayed on into the Sixth Form for one year and then moved to a college in Oxford to complete my A-levels in Chemistry, Biology and Maths. I went to medical school at the Royal Free Hospital in Hampstead, London where I studied for five years to become a doctor. I also undertook an additional year of learning to gain a BSc in Infection. I

qualified in 2000 and it took me ten years to progress through all the training I needed to do to become an emergency medicine consultant, with a lot of exams taken along the way.

I have now been a consultant for ten years and in that time I was the Lead consultant for the ED for several years and am currently the Training Programme Director for the emergency medicine training or higher specialist trainees in the Thames Valley region. The current pandemic has certainly been challenging and there have been some very hard times. The PPE that you have heard a lot about in the news is very important to protect us but is also challenging to work in as you get very hot and it's much harder to hear what your colleagues are saying to you. Whilst there have been difficult times in recent weeks, it has really pulled us together as a team, both doctors and nurses who are working so closely alongside each other and supporting each other every day.


ANNA GAMBRILL (YEAR 10)

IN MEMORY OF KATIE JOHNSTON



Former Coldstream Guards officer, Major Andrew Johnston, who has been dependent on a wheelchair for over 25 years, has less than 10 miles to wheel on his MajorAndysMarathon lockdown challenge. Inspired by Captain Tom Moore, the 61 year-old who was medically discharged in 1996 after 20 years' service, having contracted Multiple Sclerosis, has been wheeling the 26 miles 385 yards of the marathon distance in his 10 yard-long kitchen/family room using his NHS provided wheelchair. Major Johnston is the father of our former Head of Music, Katie Johnston, until her death from Secondary Breast Cancer in May 2018. The family are determined to help the school build on Katie's legacy by providing more creative and performance opportunities for musicians and non -musicians alike, including SEN students, both in the school and, ultimately, in the wider community once things return to something resembling normal. Graduate Cover Supervisor – To start September 2020

We have an exciting opportunity for a graduate who is keen to gain some experience working in a school prior to considering teacher training with Teach Maidenhead. You would be supervising classes during the short-term absence of the assigned teacher giving you opportunities to gain experience working in a classroom environment alongside students at Key Staff 3 and 4. Your main responsibility would be to instruct students about the work set by the teacher and assisting them to stay on task and complete the work set to the best of their ability. The provision of cover will be varied. For example, you might introduce the work by talking through a Power Point, showing video clips or reading through texts with students. You may be asked to lead a class discussion, organise group work or supervise PE and Drama activities. An important aspect of the role will also involve learning about school policies and how they are implemented including the school's behaviour policy and Ready2Learn rules, and have the chance to improve subject knowledge in all areas including your specialist subject in readiness for an application to train to teach.

In addition to this, you will have the opportunity to spend time in some of the other departments in the school responsible for supporting our students. For example, in our Raising Achievement Department. This team work hard to ensure progress and development of students at all Key Stages including Sixth Form by offering them high quality academic mentoring using intervention and support programmes, one-to-one and small groups support and help with building their confidence and self-esteem. Also in our specialist Autistic Spectrum Disorder Unit with specially trained teachers and Learning Support Assistants who support students with ASD enabling them to flourish in a classroom environment wherever possible, with additional support in subjects or other areas of the curriculum which they find challenging. You may also spend some time with our Alternative Curriculum Manager whose main objective is to source and oversee the provision of alternative curriculum for those students in school who will benefit and help to enhance their education and career opportunities when they leave school. Throughout the school there is a team of Learning Support Assistants who support a wide range of students with Special Educational Needs and there would also be opportunities to work alongside them as well.
