GENEVA TRIP 2023

Olivia Wojas (Year 12): 'Spending the weekend in Geneva was a rousing new experience that showed me the Swiss culture, architecture and way of life. Over the weekend, we got to see The United Nations, The Red Cross Museum and even spent our Saturday evening in a bowling alley!

The day we arrived was instantly thrilling as we first visited the UN, which shared with us considerable information on current political events and tensions as well as showing well -known meeting rooms that have previously been where ground-breaking decisions about the United Nations have been made. I found that as we took a tour around some of the building, not only did I get to learn a lot about politics (which I don't usually take an interest in), but it also opened our eyes to opportunities if we wanted to go in the direction of fighting for human rights in the future - using our scientific knowledge.



Following the visit to CERN, we headed down to a spectacular night playing bowling and finishing off our trip with the Red Cross Museum, which was filled with prodigious and inspired art exhibitions - showing us an extensive selection of stories of impacted countries, ranging from the first World War to recent years of conflict.'

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Tilly Connolly (Year 12): The Saturday of our trip was the main reason we went to Geneva, and as A-level Physics students, we were eager and ready to ask lots of questions. We were very lucky to walk around CERN's remarkable science facility, The Large Hadron Collider (which is to thank for today's extraordinary development in particle physics) whilst having a well-educated tour guide who knew the machinery and the complicated science behind it. During the tour, we learnt fascinating facts that fuelled our passion for physics, and gained helpful knowledge about the Large Hadron Collider which linked back to our A level Physics course.

The day was an exciting insight into what our subjects can lead to; it was an honour to be amongst physicists who have played a part in discovering what we learn at school.

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'My grandmother loved to tell me this story because it would teach me a lesson. My horrifying screams seemed to fuel her to go on and by the time she had finished, my mum would have to come pick me up off the floor where I was bawling my eyes out and praying it wouldn't happen to me. She would always get scolded by the end but that never stopped her.

Neverea, that's what she called it. Some random historic word I never had the pleasure to translate. But that doesn't matter, the story is what leaves chills down your spine and gives you sleepless nights. You see, we live in a small, off grid village where everyone knows each other and no one speaks of its history. Our little village is cast as the outcast's hub spot, since the mayor from the town over sends all his rejects to us. One specific reject changed history forever. Her name was Noritcia. Rumors had it that she was a witch; but not your standardized, boring, hag like witch you see in October, no, she dealt with the underworld. The underworld we were specifically told not to mess with or summon. But she did. All because of love.

One moody, foggy night she had arrived in a black gravers car. Everyone thought it was another coffin to bury but as she came into sight, we realised that the mayor had sent over his monthly delivery. My grandmother had told me I was still in the womb, safely tucked away from this twisted deliverance. She had come with no luggage and barely any clothes on her bare, pale body that resembled one of an 80 year old on their death bed. But she looked only past a 14-year-old. Maybe she was sick? No one knew because she spoke rarely and only in whispers as if she was constantly in a trance of prayer or curse. She was put into a spare shed-like house at the far end of the village where they thought she would get her senses back together and begin to speak as to why she was sent here. They only got her name on an off chance of a woodchuck cutting wood nearby and hearing her singing 'Noritcia' over and over again. They just assumed it was her name but oh how they were wrong.

A few weeks had gone by with no progress from her; by now the people, including my grandmother, were getting ready for the winter, ensuring supplies were up. People tried to help the new girl, but they gave up quickly when accounts were saying that all they could hear was the dreaded singing and could see her sitting in a hex circle with a cloud of red dust

During many nights my grandmother would wake up with a start and look out the window to see the girl pacing the streets with urgency, hands raised screaming from an ancient, mud stricken book that belonged in the trash. My grandmother would one day decide to put on her little leather boots and wrap into a blanket, only to run after Noritcia. They were basically the same age and she wanted to make a friend but that would later result in a future spiral of trauma and down fall. Catching up to her fast, because she really wasn't pacing that fast, my grandmother knew no better than to shout her name over the singing. Despite how much noise there was going on the girl immediately turned and stared at my grandmother, her eyes glazing over red and her mouth foaming. Another word escaped my grandmother, and everything disappeared, the little girl's body hunching over and spitting in exhaustion. It was as if my grandmother had interrupted her trance of something.

Looking like a deer in headlights, the little girl stole one more glance at the villager that had taken her away from reaching her one lover and ran away deep into the forest behind her house. Once my grandmother had told her mum what had happened she was immediately taken to the priest where he made her pray over and over again, for they had thought she had been cursed.

Since then gossip began to spread in the village and no sign of the girl fuelled the rumours further. Had she finally gone? Had God taken its toll on her? They would never know until disasters began happening. People missing, houses burning, draughts, famine, you name it, the village was struck by it. No one knew what was happening.

Except my grandmother. She was the last one to see and speak to the girl, but she refused to spill what Noritcia had whispered incoherently. She was under a promise, one that could get her killed. So the town kept on suffering and she remained quiet until her family decided to leave the hell the place had became and start a new life in a new state. Seasons passed and years went on, until I was born and my grandmother had become frail. Given her circumstances she didn't have long left.

So, she told me the story. The full thing. With her secret that would cost her life. Because she sensed something was coming, another witch full of surprises. Our family was cursed forever. My grandmother was too stubborn that night. I can never sleep soundly again. Now I survive in constant fear. My grandmother will soon die, and I will be the one to carry her mistakes and burdens until death.

So, you see, believe whatever you want from this story, Someone will always be watching you.'

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YEAR 10 AND 11 CONSTRUCTION

Our Year 10 & 11 Construction classes had the pleasure of being invited to visit a building site by BAM Construction. BAM Construction were contracted, by the DofE to build a new school for 900 students in Surrey for a new catchment area.

Prior to the tour, the students learned the processes involved in ensuring the ground was at the correct standard before the construction could begin. They were given information about the different roles of the employees as well as the 140 different trades involved in such projects.

There is a temporary structure on site, hosting current Year 7, until the school is ready for them to move into in September. The school is expected to eventually house 900 students. This visit gave the students an insight into a live construction site and showed them how the skills learned in their lessons could potentially be utilised in the work place.

The visit was incredibly valuable and we are grateful to BAM Construction for the opportunity to visit.



Jake Coomes (Year 11) : We went to Heathside School to see them build a school with different construction workers. We learned how to get an apprenticeship working on a construction site. The trip benefitted me because it taught me what it would be like to work on a construction site.



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Luke Maddox (Year 11): We went to Heathside school in Surrey to see a construction site. They were building a brand new school for 900 students. We learned about apprenticeships and what they are and how to get in touch with potential employers. On site, we learned how the workers schedule their day and what different trades do. I liked that we got to see a building being constructed, and a real life working environment. It benefitted me as it helps us in our lesson and we can use what we saw on the construction site as examples. I liked seeing what it would look and be like.



Harrison Barry (Year 11): We went to a construction site where a school was being built. I learned many things such as how the site runs and some of the different trades involved in the project. We learned many skills such as the types of jobs we could get and how to get an apprenticeship. I liked how the trip showed us about what goes on in a live building site and how they function.

The winner will win 1000 points for their House, 2nd place will win 600 points for their House, 3rd place will win 400 points for their House, 4th place will win 200 points for their House.


The winning team will also win some sweet treats!




FUNDRAISING EVENTS – YOU ARE
