#### **SUMMER TERM UNIFORM UPDATE**

We hope you and your son / daughter enjoy these events.


# YEAR 11 EXAM PHASES AND SUPPORT GCSE Exam Preparation Schedule

#### PRISON ME NO WAY!

#### Our students' experiences:



"The day started off with a bang! We explored different elements of prison life from one bunk to another bunk. Learning about what life is like in a humid, warm prison cell and prisoners' day to day life. The lesson was super interesting and full of juicy facts. We also had a very surprising tour of a working realistic cell that made my brain a bit more curious.

After that, we had a conversation about how one choice can lead you down the wrong path. It was all about making the right choice to stay out of trouble. We learnt about a story of about how one boy who made the wrong decision ended up getting charged for manslaughter. It was a very engaging story that had me on the very edge of my seat. We then decided who was in the wrong, what should be their punishment and let our judge decide what his punishment should be."

"Throughout the day we participated in 5 talks from the PMNW team. During my first period my tutor group had the Red Cross session in the library, it involved basic first aid and various scenarios where this is needed and the woman told us how to deal with said scenarios. There were photocards and short videos and she also provided models which further explained how first aid works.

In my second period we had the choices session in the main hall, we were in a talk with an ex-prisoner who talked to us about his experience and the choices he made that caused the consequences he had to endure; which was his 10 year prison sentence.

Next period, we had the drugs session, where we learnt about different types of drugs and their effect on people. We also got to wear goggles that simulated how people on LSD and alcohol see.

In fourth period we had a county lines session and last period we had a prison session where we got to visit a real prison cell and understand what its like in prison for both men and women through talking to an ex-prison guard."

"On Monday, the School invited guests from Prison Me No Way to talk to us students about prison life, choices and overall, how the small decisions we make can later affect us in life. During the day, we explored different branches of bad choices which included underage and excessive drug using, stealing and more.

The day was divided into our usual 5-period lessons which were mainly spent in the humanities block. The discussion was held by ex-prison guards, ex-prisoners and a few workers within that community.

I and I believe other students learnt a lot from the sessions as it gave us a chance to think and reflect about how life can change in one small moment and having to life with that guilt and regret every day. One of the guests was an ex-prisoner, he was very vocal about how choices can change your life and how his changed his life drastically. However, my favourite and most memorable session was the 'One Punch' lesson led by an ex-guard. He spoke about the difference between murder and manslaughter and how to evaluate a case. The case was between Ben and George, two teenage boys. What made it so enjoyable was me being the Judge and my judgement was a 7 year sentence!"

"We met people that shared some of their own personal experiences. And they showed us what they do, for example there were two retired police officers and an exprisoner. They talked about prison, drugs and county lines. The people we talked to were part of an organisation called Prison Me No Way, they were teaching us about certain things that involve crime.

What was so memorable about it is that how they explained their stories to us with such depth and they tried to make us understand how bad prison and getting involved with gangs and drugs or anything like that could be and how those actions can affect your life. Which was very much something to remember as it is a good reminder to people not to go down the path which leads you to prison."

#### Ethan writes:

This was an 11 day long experience which gave me the opportunity to play Egypt, Ireland and Poland. It was a 3 hour coach ride from Warsaw airport. We stayed in large sporting hotel located on a lake on the outskirts of a small village north of Warsaw. Each day we would follow the same routine of conditioning and stretching before a match or training. We would travel to various stadiums close by where we either trained for the matches ahead of us or 3 of the days, play another country.



After these matches we would have to do recovery such as ice baths, saunas, massages and other stretching and therapy. Overall it was an amazing experience and have appreciated all the support I have gotten from the school and others."
