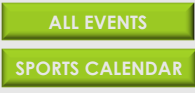
Student Finalists - The Dynamic Duo need your vote!

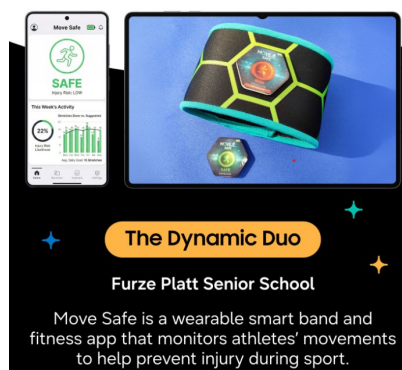

Graduation: Wednesday 17th June at 4.30pm

Year 11 Exam Phase 1 - Thursday 7.5.26 – Thursday 21.5.26 (inclusive)

A reminder that there will be a full revision / final preparation programme throughout the exam period, with subject-specific preparation sessions as short a time as possible before the exam. (This will normally be the afternoon before a morning exam or the morning before an afternoon exam – where it does not clash with another exam.)

During Exam Phase 1, students will either be in an exam, a revision session for that exam or in their normal lessons. When in normal lessons, students will have a choice of either working with their teacher for that subject or to revise for another subject – quiet study will be expected. However, students will not be expected to attend tutor time and will thus not be required in school until 8.45am if they have a 9.00am exam or 9.10am if they are going to normal lessons or a revision session. When students have an afternoon exam they will be permitted to leave the school site as soon as the exam finishes.

Exam Phase 2 – Friday 22.5.26 – Wednesday 17.6.25 (inclusive)

Students will attend their exams and the associated revision sessions. When they are not in an exam or a revision session they will have Home Study, where they will be expected to be working at home preparing for their next exam. Access to the library to study during phase 2 is possible for limited number of students, however permission will need to be given by myself or Mr Jones in advance. 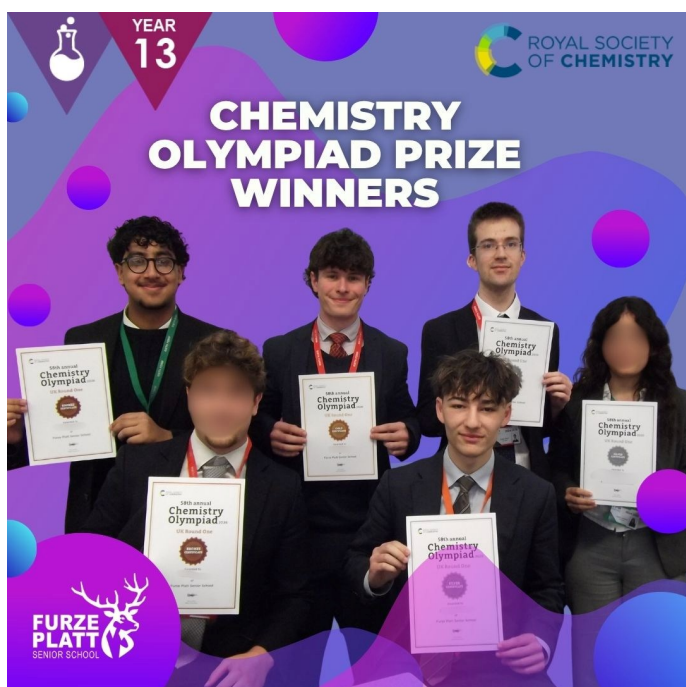

Chemistry Olympiad Success!

Congratulations to Saurav, Raph, Matej, Alexandros, Daniel, Namfon, Iqra, Tom, Imogen, Elenia, Edward, Daiki and Arnavi on their fantastic achievements in this year's Royal Society of Chemistry Olympiad!



With over 17,000 students taking part nationally - and fewer than 1,500 achieving Gold - our students performed exceptionally well:

- 2 Gold Awards
- 6 Silver Awards
- 5 Bronze Awards

This is our strongest set of results in many years - a brilliant reflection of their hard work, curiosity and commitment to excellence.

Science Fair 2026

On Monday 16th March we held our second Years 7-9 Science Fair.



The innovation and talent on display was incredible - our judges and visitors were extremely impressed. Thank you to all of the wonderful students, staff and parents who got involved. As well as our overall winners (pictured), the science team have picked their personal winners below:



Ms Malanchuk:

Thomas and Isaac – Video game addiction – “I had a lovely conversation with Thomas and Isaac about the factors that can contribute to a gaming addiction. They gave me a lot of great advice for friends who may develop this addiction! Not only is this a relevant topic for teens, but a really interesting issue in the world of neuroscience.”

Aayan – How does temperature affect mould growth on bread? – “This experiment followed excellent scientific method procedures, including a negative control! Your data was presented well with discussion about temperature on mould growth and made a very interesting read. Great work!”

Tolomey, Thomas and Harry – Nerf gun accuracy – “I loved that Tolomey, Thomas and Harry defined the difference between accuracy and precision in their experiment. They had just the right amount of engagement (allowing Science Fair goers to try out the Nerf gun!) and good science in their presentation.”

Matthew and Finley – Steak resting time – “Matthew and Finley are clearly steak connoisseurs - they demonstrated their findings with biological explanations for the tenderness of the steak after letting it rest. Well done!”

Ginny – Extracting DNA from strawberries – “Ginny's artistic skills came in handy with her beautiful presentation. She had excellent photos of her DNA extraction, a very cool and visually impressive process.”

Zoe and Alice – Comparing medicines – “Zoe and Alice's experiment had a great comparison between generic and name-brand painkillers. I also appreciated their "Which pill would you rather swallow?" survey question. The parameters of the experiment were clear, with multiple factors being compared.”

Julio and Lucas – School carbon footprint – “Julio and Lucas put a huge amount of work in for this presentation, comparing different departments in the school. It was unfortunate that the Science department has the highest carbon footprint, but there are clear improvements to be made in the future.”

Dr Graham:

Thomas and Isaac – Video game addiction – “A well designed scientific research project with a good yield of data, they were very knowledgeable of their project and drew some interesting conclusions.”

Hirun – AI smart recycling bin – “This won the most innovative prize and for good reason - colourful and engaging display, embracing cutting edge technology. Hirun held his own with some tough questions from judges, well done.”

Mya - Birds of prey - “A personal favourite of mine, very ACHIEVE, very current. You were singled out for special commendation and presented your research data in an engaging and fun way.”

Jake – F1 wind tunnel – “Worthy podium (haha) finish. Jake was knowledgeable and shared his work masterfully. We had a great conversation with some interesting and tough questions from judges and you showed you had a clear scientific method.”

Zoe and Alice – Comparing medicines - “The most rigorous science on display of the night. Your research, knowledge and discussion were all on point and was a wonderful display of science at FPSS.”

Julio and Lucas – School carbon footprint – “ You received special commendation and food for thought for judges. Using and basing your project around FPSS will always impress me, but this had heart, data and suggestions for the future, great science!”

Luke – 3D printing – “Your project was very proudly presented and showed a clear interest in a novel technology. I would love to see an experiment using your items, such as comparing a 3D printed item like a fork with a metal one.”

Mr Wright:

Jake – F1 wind tunnel – “Jake's passion for F1 was palpable as he expertly explained the intricacies of aerodynamics in the sport. He also knew the subtle differences in each of his life-like models. Jake showcased his interest in physics and engineering and had a well-designed system for testing the aerodynamics of his model cars. His results were surprising and presented clearly in a graph.”

Mya – Birds of prey – “Mya's project was engaging and well presented. Mya meticulously gathered her data from reliable sources and had clear criteria for which bird of prey was to be deemed the best "all-rounder". I love that this incorporated the Furze Platt Houses for some extra competition!”

Mrs McElligott:

Hirun – AI smart recycling bin – “Hirun's project was very impressive, showcasing both creativity and technical skill. The AI-powered recycling bin was an innovative solution to a real-world problem. The model bins were great fun and very engaging for visitors at the science fair. Your project really stood out for its ingenuity and practical potential.”

Xav and Fraser – Plants on Mars – “Your project was highly engaging and demonstrated impressive scientific curiosity. It was very imaginative and showed a strong understanding of experimental methods. The simulated sandstorm using sugar was a particularly creative touch, and the containers used for the different trials were carefully prepared and effective. Great work!”

Mr Frankis:

Dylan and Myron – Electrolysis – “Great to see you independently researching and learning about such an advanced topic. Excellent attempt at the live demonstration of testing the gases and thinking of the useful future applications.”

Liam and Matti – How different wheels affect model car speed - “Great use of variables to test different design features in a fair and valid way. They also demonstrated interesting ideas about how they could go further and test other ideas too.”

Mr Anderson:

Theo, Eddy and Felix – Egg drop – “Your project was exceptional in its scope. It demonstrates the scientific process where you made an assumption and developed a hypothesis on the strength of eggshells. Through testing (experimentation) you have demonstrated that when the hard but brittle shell is removed, it reduces the actual breaking of the egg when dropped. Not only does this develop the scientific process, but it is a platform for further research and presentation of your concluded results.”

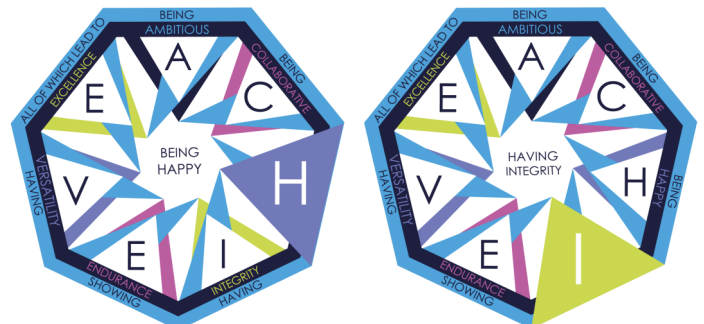

What is the World Cup?

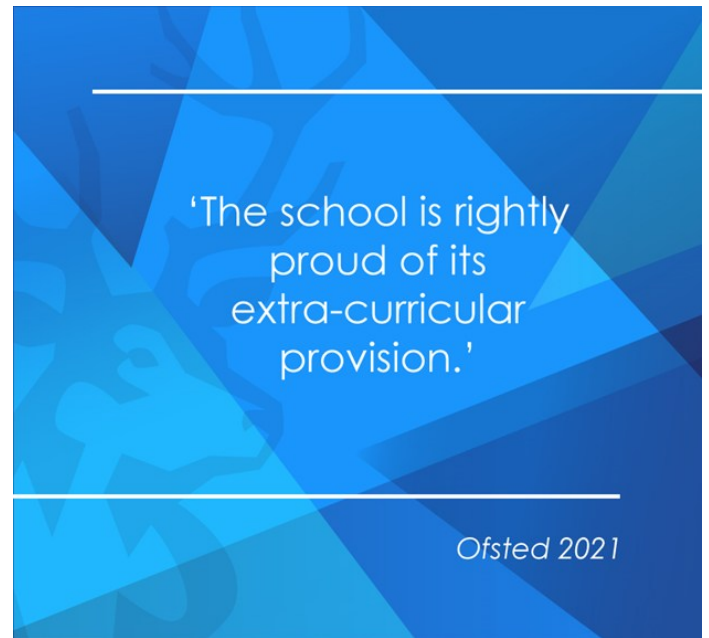
- The Fifa World Cup is one of the biggest football competitions in the world.
