

Welcome back!



My focus for this week is on working hard for the upcoming PPEs. This is a pivotal moment in the academic year and it is important to check and reflect on our study habits working towards these.

It is important that you are working habitually towards these examinations so that you give yourself every opportunity for success. An under-prepared PPE week can really shake students – don't let it shake you!

Here are some things that you can be doing to get yourself PPE-ready:

- 1) Up the hours. We encourage you to complete between 9hrs and 18hrs of study per subject, per fortnight. Many of you have acknowledged that you're not hitting this and so by upping your study time you will have greater control over what you're doing.
- **2) Plan for revision.** Identify when and where you are going to be completing revision each week. If possible, try to keep to the same slots each fortnight so that it becomes a good study habit.

3) Solidify knowledge:

- 1) Physical flashcards and Leitner by now you should have created your flashcards for your topics. Use them effectively!
- **2) Brain dumps:** Write everything that you need to remember (or think <u>might</u> be correct) about a topic on a page. Use another colour to correct or fill in the gaps.

4) Test, test, test:

- 1) Knowledge quizzing: Multiple rounds of 5 minutes every day.
- 2) Put exam questions in a pencil case/ fold them in half and select randomly answer the question/ plan the question to the best of your ability regardless (this will mimic how the real exams will be).
- **3) Exam practice:** Answer questions in full, sections that reflect the skills you struggle with, components etc. Vary this up.
- 5) Review previous assessments: Look back over the work that you completed last year and the Next Steps you completed/ did not complete. Re-do these next steps or use your work to identify the targets that you need to address in your revision.

A higher education jargon buster

Understanding the jargon of higher education can be tricky! I've created this guide to help you make sense of the common words and phrases that your young person might come across as they explore their higher education options.

Bachelor's degree

The most common type of undergraduate degree. These are typically three-year programmes, although this can vary depending on the course and university.

There are different types available, most commonly BA (Bachelor of Arts), BSc (Bachelor of Science), BEng (Bachelor of Engineering) and LLB (Bachelor of Laws).

Joint honours

Joint honours degrees combine two or more subjects and can cross disciplines and faculties – this is a great option for those who enjoy different subjects.

Degree apprenticeships

An alternative route into higher education; with the support of an existing employer, students can study towards a degree while working and earning.

Foundation year

The first level of study available at university is a foundation year, designed to improve academic skills and subject-specific knowledge. These can be standalone one-year courses or integrated as part of a Bachelor's degree.

Sandwich programmes

These provide students with the chance to incorporate a study abroad or placement year into their university course. Typically extending the course length by one year, this option can provide a unique opportunity to study overseas or gain work experience to enhance employability.

UCAS

The Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) is an independent charity which provides the UK's shared online undergraduate application service.

Undergraduate

A student studying for their first degree; typically a foundation or bachelor's degree.

Postgraduate

A student who has gained an undergraduate degree and is studying towards a higher degree, such as a Master's or PhD.

Firm choice

If applying to university via UCAS, students can apply to up to five universities and then select their firm choice – this is the applicant's first choice of university.

Insurance choice

Alongside their firm choice university, applicants can select an insurance university – their second choice.

Clearing

Typically opening at the beginning of July each year, Clearing is where universities open up any remaining spaces on their courses. Students can apply directly to the university via Clearing once they have their final qualifications and may use this option if they were not accepted by their firm or insurance choices, or have simply changed their mind about their chosen university or course.

Open Days

These events provide the opportunity for students to visit universities and often include tours, subject taster talks and the option to meet staff and students. Attending an Open Day will help your young person learn more about higher education and make informed choices.

Personal statement

This forms part of the university application, submitted via UCAS. This is your young person's opportunity to personalise their application, demonstrating their enthusiasm and passion for their subject.

Scholarships and bursaries

Non-repayable financial support for students who meet certain criteria or eligibility.

Student finance

Provided by the Student Loans Company aka. Student Finance England (SFE). Full-time UK undergraduate students can apply for Tuition Fee and Maintenance Loans to contribute to the costs of university.



| 2 May 2023 | UCAS' search tool displays 2024 courses. |

| 9 May 2023 | The adviser portal opens for 2024 entry. From this date, you can set up your adviser portal ready for your students to link to your centre. |
| 16 May 2023 | Undergraduate applications open for 2024 entry. From this date, applicants can start their applications and send them to you for references and approval. |
| 12 July 2023 | Conservatoire applications open for 2024 entry. From this date, applicants can register, pay, and send their applications. |
| 5 September 2023 | Completed undergraduate applications can be submitted to UCAS. |
| 2 October 2023 18:00 (UK time) | Application deadline for conservatoire music applications. Applications for dance, drama, and musical theatre courses may have a different deadline – check conservatoires' websites for information. |
| 16 October 2023 18:00 (UK time) | Deadline for applications to the universities of Oxford and Cambridge, and for most courses in medicine, dentistry, and veterinary medicine/science. The reference must be completed before the application can be sent to us. |
| 31 January 2024 18:00 (UK time) | Equal consideration date for applications for most undergraduate courses. The reference must be completed before the application can be sent to us. Deadline for most conservatoire undergraduate dance, drama or musical theatre courses. Check on the specific course to be sure. |
| 28 February 2024 | Extra opens – applicants who have used all five choices and are not holding any offers may be able to add another choice in their application. |
