Year 12 News





It has been a busy week for Year 12 and I know lots of students are feeling a step up in terms of work load and expectations. As workload increases, it is paramount that the good habits discussed and formed at the start of the year remain and continue to be embedded into your daily routines.

In our Wednesday form time this week students explored the GROW coaching model, using goal setting to inform practice and set achievable goals for this week, term or year. Again, it is only with good study habits, that these goals can be achieved. So, lets remind ourselves what good study habits look like:

- 1. Understanding the correct climate for learning- what distracts you? Take these out of your learning environment, turn off your phone, have food and drink with you so you don't have to leave to get refreshments. Have a quiet and calm atmosphere.
- 2. Time management- Have a 'free' after a lesson then go straight to silent study to continue your work whilst you are in the right frame of mind, then take a break. Physiologically change the idea of a 'free' and instead think of it as an independent study. Schedule your time for TSS; through term 1 week gave work logs- use these to manage the time effectively and have clear targets. Don't leave work until the last minute –rushed work is never high quality. Don't' be swayed by others- remember your goals and aspirations.
- 3. Seeking support- Do you have any resources that could support you? Can you attend an intervention session for the subject or request a 1:1 with your teacher? Your teachers and the sixth form team are there to support you. You must speak out if you are unclear or struggling.
- 4. Planning for success- At the start of the week set yourself clear deadlines. Stick to these deadlines. Prioritise tasks- don't just focus on the ones your see as 'easier'.



How to support your young person with their university and course choices

For many parents, it can be daunting as their young person decides to take the plunge into the university world. If you then add in the question of what course and where they'd like to study for the next three years, it can feel like an overwhelming decision. You may be thinking "What can I do to help?". These three pieces of advice will give you the confidence to offer that support.



Tip one: Explore the options

It sounds straightforward as a starting point, but it's important that students do not rush course and university research. Being so determined to make the right choice can sometimes mean they dive into the specifics without looking to see what else is out there

A simple UCAS search will help your young person find all the possible universities that offer their chosen course and you never know what variations they might discover. For example, did you know that students can study a combined degree of Geography and Spanish & Latin American Studies? There are thousands of course opportunities available.



Tip two: Make a list of what's important

Create a mind map, table, spreadsheet – whatever works best for your young person to visualise all the different options! Together, you can prioritise what is most important to them, which will help them to narrow their choices. Does the course offer the modules they're interested in? Is the location exciting to them? Does the university offer the facilities they need? Whatever it is, make it clear which universities tick these boxes, you could even see which are the true contenders.



Tip three: Take a look around

The biggest recommendation is to visit the university if you can. It isn't always possible to do this, Open Days might not fit into calendars easily; some universities may be quite a distance away; or you just don't have the means to get there.

However, if you're able to, encourage your young person to go with you for a visit. There's something about stepping onto a campus for the first time, it can't be explained, but they'll know if it isn't the right fit or if it feels like it could be their new home for the next three or four years.



Yes, your young person is about to make an important decision about their future, but there is so much support out there for students and you as parents and carers. The best thing you can do is encourage your young person every step of the way, and even step out of the way if necessary, so they can ultimately make the choice that is right for them.


UCAS deadlines for the 2024 cycle



2024 ENTRY KEY DATES

2 May 2023	UCAS' search tool displays 2024 courses.
9 May 2023	The adviser portal opens for 2024 entry. From this date, you can set up your adviser portal ready for your students to link to your centre.
16 May 2023	Undergraduate applications open for 2024 entry. From this date, applicants can start their applications and send them to you for references and approval.
12 July 2023	Conservatoire applications open for 2024 entry. From this date, applicants can register, pay, and send their applications.
5 September 2023	Completed undergraduate applications can be submitted to UCAS.
2 October 2023 18:00 (UK time)	Application deadline for conservatoire music applications. Applications for dance, drama, and musical theatre courses may have a different deadline – check conservatoires' websites for information.
16 October 2023 18:00 (UK time)	Deadline for applications to the universities of Oxford and Cambridge, and for most courses in medicine, dentistry, and veterinary medicine/science. The reference must be completed before the application can be sent to us.
31 January 2024 18:00 (UK time)	Equal consideration date for applications for most undergraduate courses. The reference must be completed before the application can be sent to us. Deadline for most conservatoire undergraduate dance, drama or musical theatre courses. Check on the specific course to be sure.
28 February 2024	Extra opens – applicants who have used all five choices and are not holding any offers may be able to add another choice in their application.
