Department Information:
The Politics Department sits within the History Department at Furze Platt. Lessons are provided by two specialists in the subject who share a passion for Gov't and Politics in the UK, USA and political ideologies. Great emphasis is placed on the role of the supercurricular in substantiating class discussion and we passionately recommend resources for students to enrich their understanding of the course.

ACHIEVE in the curriculum:
Students will be ambitious in understanding a broad range of content.

Students will learn to be versatile in practicing different historical skills such as source evaluation, interpretation analysis and maintaining judgements.

Students will be experts at endurance – a two year history course is a lot of fun, but a lot of content. They will learn to manage the expectations of the course and become resilient in how to overcome this challenge.

Curriculum Aims & Intent:
During this year, students will continue to explore political ideologies (Conservatism and Feminism) examining the key beliefs about human nature, society, the state and the economy before evaluating the similarities and differences between different branches of the ideology. They will also examine the key beliefs of named thinkers and become adept at analysing extracts from the thinker's original work.

Students will complete their study of US Gov't and Politics, analysing and evaluating the key features of the US Constitution, Congress, President, Supreme Court, Pressure Group system, Electoral Process and Political Parties. They will compare these issues with similar issues in the UK and form synoptic links between the two modules.
