How the course works...

- 60% coursework (including practical examinations) and 40% written exam
- 3 major components across 2 years
- Study is in the perspective of Actors', Directors', Designers' as well as the Audience.

Fundamental Skills

- The fundamental skills explored within A Level revolve around:
 - Research
 - Interpretation
 - Creativity
 - Analysis and Evaluation



Component 1



Drama and Theatre – 40% A Level (3 hour exam)

Section A: one question (from a choice) on one of the set plays from List A (25 marks)
(Drama through the ages)

Servant To Two Masters

Section B: two part question on a given extract from one of the set plays (30 marks)

Timberlake Wertenbaker- Our Country's Good

Section C: one question on the work of theatre makers in a single live theatre production (25 marks)

Component Two

Creating original Drama 30% A level (marked internally)

Can be assessed as:

- Performer
- Lighting designer
- Sound designer
- Set designer
- Costume designer
- Puppet designer
- Director

Component Three



Making theatre 30% A Level (examined by AQA)

For this component students must practically explore (workshop) and interpret three key extracts each from a different play and complete two assessment tasks:

1. Students will formally present Extract 3 to an audience and an external examiner (40 marks)
2. Students will produce an individual Reflective Report analysing and evaluating their theatrical interpretation of all three key extracts studied (20 marks)

For the performance of Extract 3 students must apply the work and methodologies of one of the prescribed theatre practitioners.

Examples of student work

The following clips are from Year 12 and Year 13 performances.

Each has a prescribed practitioner.

Entry Requirements

- GCSE Drama at a grade 5 or above
- All students must have an interest in Drama and Theatre Studies
- All students must achieve a grade 5 at GCSE English
- Pupils must be prepared to rehearse and see live theatre **in their own time**

Technical Theatre

- All students have to study theatre from a designers perspective but some pupils choose to specialise in technical theatre. The school are happy to offer this option although we only have the required facilities for students to specialise in Directing, Costume, Mask, Set Design, Lighting or Sound.
- If students do chose to specialise in technical theatre they must understand the acting process as they will be asked to comment on acting styles and techniques in coursework and examinations.
- Technical theatre students may be asked to work independently of their peers or with outside practitioners and teachers.

Why study Drama and Theatre?
